I am pleased to present The Foundation's annual Impact Report, highlighting our achievements and strategic initiatives in the past year. At FDD, we aim to provide equitable access to opportunities that maximize the potential of individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. I am proud to report on our progress toward this goal.

As we work to bring awareness to the remarkable initiatives that serve individuals with IDDs, we also provide scholarships to students entering the IDD field and emergency funds to the San Diego Regional Center's 42,000 clients facing financial hardship.

In FY2023-2024, we increased our program funding, awarded 10 scholarships, hosted two successful in-person fundraisers, funded an affordable housing development that set aside 18 units for people with IDDs, and provided emergency assistance to 266 individuals with IDDs and their families. PROGRAMMATIC STRATEGY


We consider the evolving needs of our community and make strategic decisions surrounding initiatives that focus on individuals with IDDs.

Our programs support all individuals with IDDs including their families to enhance their quality of life.

Over the past five years, FDD has **provided**1.4 million dollars in grants to support 125
nonprofit organizations throughout San
Diego and Imperial County. More recently,
the Foundation has strategically focused
financial support on a select few nonprofit
organizations, channeling increased funds
to these partners to maximize their impact
and create a concentrated effort within the
IDDs community.

ADJOIN SELF-ADVOCACY CONFERENCE

focuses on advocating for the civil rights and inclusion of individuals at local, state, and federal levels and actively pushes for increased resources and policy changes to ensure people have the foundation to belong in their community. Through this partnership, FDD supports and promotes staff development by encouraging participation in conferences and other professional development opportunities, equipping the team with the knowledge and skills needed to effectively advocate and lead in the iniatives we serve.

AMANDA'S ADAPTIVE MARTIAL ARTS,

Certified Occupational Therapy Assistant
Amanda Piepgras has masterfully
combined her passion for martial arts with
her dedication to children with special
needs, creating an inclusive and
transformative program. Amanda's unique
approach addresses various challenges
faced by these children, including sensory
processing issues, attention span difficulties,
impulse control, body awareness, and
muscle strength deficiencies. Through
adaptive martial arts, she provides tailored
coaching that helps children master new
skills, build confidence, and enhance their
physical and mental well-being.

HOME OF GUIDING HANDS is one of the largest organizations in San Diego and Imperial Counties providing disability support services. HGH is dedicated to helping individuals learn, grow, and live quality lives and offers a wide range of services, including Residential, Respite, Tailored Day, Independent Living Skills, Early Childhood Development, Transportation, and Life Planning. Moreover, HGH is committed to delivering high-quality education and support through their programs, making a positive impact on individuals of all ages in the community.

INCLUD(ED) As a teacher and the Founder & Director of Includ(Ed), Anna Chiles faced widespread rejection when seeking a school for her son Theo, who has Down syndrome. Preschool directors cited a lack of resources without meeting Theo or understanding his abilities.

Anna discovered that many parents in the disability community share similar experiences, with children often excluded from early education in San Diego County. This exclusion leaves them less prepared for kindergarten and forces parents to become primary caregivers.

In response, Anna is building a fully inclusive school where children with disabilities can learn alongside their peers.

KITCHEN tABLE ACADEMY supports students with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDDs) by providing hands-on training in culinary arts, nutrition, smart farming, and waste management, preparing them for careers in the culinary and hospitality industries. Students learn essential cooking techniques, kitchen safety, meal preparation, healthy eating, dietary planning, and food service management, equipping them for roles in restaurants, catering services, and health and wellness sectors. Training in sustainable practices, such as smart farming and waste management, further prepares them for employment in farm-to-table restaurants, urban farming, and environmentally conscious enterprises. The Academy's comprehensive, practical education and supportive learning environment help students with IDDs gain the skills, confidence, and experience needed for fulfilling careers.

Nurturing Kind Hearts and Curious Minds: San Diego Children's Discovery Museum Celebrates 24 Years of Enriching Experiences

In its 24th year, the San Diego Children's Discovery Museum (SDCDM), a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization, remains devoted to providing engaging educational exhibits and programs. With an annual visitation of over 100,000, encompassing children, families, and school groups, the Museum fosters kind hearts and curious minds with a focus on social-emotional learning (SEL) and STREAM (science, technology, reading, engineering, arts, and math).

SDCDM passionately encourages children to explore and comprehend the world through hands-on experiences, imagination, and joyful experimentation. Continuing its commitment in its 24th year, the Museum strives to maintain an interactive and enriching environment for young minds to thrive.

Recognizing the San Diego Children's Discovery Museum's dedication, the Foundation for Developmental Disabilities (FDD) generously donated \$17,000. This specific contribution aimed to enhance the Museum's Sensory Sunday initiative.

Sensory Sundays, held every Sunday from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., cater to families with children on the spectrum or those with sensory sensitivities. These sessions are meticulously designed to create a warm and inclusive space, offering a serene setting for children and families to enjoy the museum's experiences.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Unified Esports League --A Gaming and Technology Education Program

The Unified Esports League is a non-profit committed to bringing together individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDDs) through the transformative power of technology and gaming. Unified Esports empowers those with IDDs by enabling them to translate their passion for gaming and technology into prospective career or educational opportunities.

By leveraging the benefits of team sports and gaming, Esports aims to bolster communication, collaboration, and critical thinking skills among individuals with IDDs.

Simultaneously, it introduces them to potential opportunities within the gaming and STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) industries. Program leaders are dedicated to broadening the horizons of those with IDDs by cultivating positive and constructive gaming environments. Specifically designed curriculum units empower students to pursue ambitious goals like career or college pathways, acquire driving skills, and participate in team-based competitions.

Their program operates throughout the year, unaffected by school timetables, except on holidays. Notably, no restrictions exist on how often students can attend these sessions.

FDD's funding was crucial in procuring the necessary furniture and technology for gaming and technology education. This encompassed curved monitors, gaming and workstation computers, virtual reality headsets, video editing and game design software, audio engineering tools, gaming consoles, and accompanying peripherals. FDD funding has not only facilitated the upgrade of equipment but has also enabled the expansion of the program's reach and impact to new locations in San Diego County.

HELP FUND PROGRAM

The FDD Help Fund program assists San Diego Regional Center clients facing emergency situations. The individuals with IDDs and families supported by this program are granted emergency funds for rental and housing, utility assistance as well as other situations that could negatively affect their quality of life.

HELP FUND PROGRAM

Our Help Fund program is one of our most impactful programs. Since 1986, we have provided approximately \$2,000,000 to directly assist the San Diego Regional Center clients in emergencies such as homelessness prevention and assistance with utilities, including water and electricity.

Below are some stories of our impact.

MAYA is a 7-year-old girl on the autism spectrum. Her mother works full-time in a nursery as the sole provider for Elizabeth and her older sister. The family was given one week's notice to move out of the place they were renting, and they had to use all their savings to look for a new place to live. The Foundation helped them with their first month's rent in the new apartment to help prevent them from becoming homeless.

Ann is a senior with a severe developmental disability. She lives on a fixed income, which is used for housing, medications, transportation, and appointments. She received an eviction notice after living in one residence for 12 years. With the assistance of her Supportive Living Service, she found a mobile estate that would meet all her needs. The Foundation assisted in paying the deposit on the new residence, allowing her to maintain her fixed income and stabilize in her new situation.



"As a family experiencing homelessness, FDD's Help Fund provided the necessary funds to secure housing. The assistance covered immediate needs and allowed us to transition to stable living conditions. FDD's support was a positive change, and we are now on a path towards a brighter future."
